Report from Megan Thomas on the 2016 IBMS Herbert Fleisch Workshop.

Firstly I would like to express my gratitude for being given an ANZBMS International Travel Award. I greatly appreciated this support to attend the 2016 Herbert Fleisch Workshop.

My aims in attending this meeting were to gain experience presenting the research that I have completed to date, to get feedback on this work and advice on how it may progress in the future, and to begin building networks within the international bone research community. I believe that all my aims were successfully met at the workshop that was held in Brugge, Belgium from the 28th of February to the 1st of March this year.

I had the opportunity to present a poster at this workshop. As these posters were made a focus of the meeting, and a generous amount of time was devoted to viewing and discussing them, I was able to present my work to many other researchers.
